






HALF YEAR TRENDING OF NO OF TRAFFIC OFFENDERS ARRESTED: 2012-2016




HALF YEAR TRENDING OF PERSONS KILLED: 2012-2016








The trend above shows that FCT, Lagos, Kaduna, Ogun and Oyo States have The highest number of Officers compared to other States such as Yobe and Bayelsa

It is observed above that there is a fairly disproportionate ratio of the Officers to Marshals in most of the Sectors except in Taraba, Kano, Adamawa and Plateau where we could spot about 4 Marshals to an Officer. The situation is not too pleasant in places like the FCT where we have less than 2 Marshals to an Officer. Meaning, that are too many Officers in such locations.






MANPOWER TREND OF NO. OF OFFICERS BY STATES/ SECTOR COMMANDS


