Health, as defined by the World Health Organization (WHO), is "a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity."




Universal Health Coverage

- ❖ UHC enables everyone to access the services that address the most significant causes of disease and death, and ensures that the quality of those services is good enough to improve the health of the people who receive them.




Key Facts on UHC

At least half (3.85 billion) of the world's population still do not have full coverage of essential health services.



 Over 800 million people (almost 12% of the world's population) spent at least 10% of their household budgets to pay for health care.



Improving Health Security through Emergency Response


Emergency Response on Health Security

Emergency Response on Health Security




Actions taken within the golden hour limit is vital to health security.

Emergency Ambulance Service Scheme (ZEBRA)

In other to reduce the severity of Road Traffic Crash and impacts, the Federal Road Safety Corps in 2009 came up with a vision of improving **Road Traffic Crash** Management by establishing **FCT Pilot Emergency Ambulance Service Scheme** (PEASS) code named "Zebra".





Emergency Ambulance Service Scheme (ZEBRA)...ii

The FCT PEASS took off with 4 Ambulance Centres. Through sustenance and improvements, the Scheme has spread to 43 nationwide.

National Community Post Crash Care Initiative (NCPCCI)

It was observed that the condition of victims of road crash get worsened through poor handling and care by some First Responders. The FRSC being convinced on this, initiated NCPCCI to communities along critical corridors in Nigeria to acquire skills to enhance post crash care.



NCPCCI...iii

The programme was initiated in 2013 with engagement and partnership building. In 2014 FRSC in collaboration with Shell Petroleum Development Corporation (**SPDC**) enlisted, trained, equipped and deployed 540 volunteers to 27 critical corridors (average of 20 volunteers per corridor) in 13 States of the country under the Pilot Scheme.

Activities at each corridor is supervised by FRSC nearest command (Host Command).

TRAINING OF FIRST RESPONDERS

Training of volunteers was carried out in four (4) centres from 7th and 10th April, 2014 as follows:

Group A: Lagos, Ogun, and Oyo (160 volunteers)-Ibadan centre

Group B: Rivers, Enugu, Delta and Anambra (180 volunteers-Enugu centre

Group C: Bauchi and Gombe (80 volunteers)-Bauchi centre

Group D: Kaduna, Niger & Kogi (120 volunteers)- Minna centre

OUTCOME OF TRAINING OF FIRST RESPONDERS




- Carried out 471rescue missions & saving 2000 lives.
- Promoted community participation in rescue activities.

Road Traffic Crash (RTC) Clinics

RTC Clinics were established along crash prone corridors to provide first hand medical assistance to victims of Road Traffic Crash before full medical care at the nearest hospital.

RTC clinics also provide basic primary health care services to host communities along the critical corridors.

Patrol Enforcement & Enlightenment

Through cautions and continuous advisory services like Free Vehicle Safety checks as well as an expanded approached on public enlightenment, preventable crashes have been achieved.



Emergency Call Centre

The FRSC Call Centre coordinates road distress responses and fast-track communications toward improved post-crash care and road stressor alleviation.





Emergency Call Centre...ii

The Emergency Call Centre operates a 24/7 Toll-free service on 122 received and responds to calls from members of the public on road emergencies nationwide.

The FRSC Call Centre has received and responded to various calls on road traffic crash, traffic congestions, enquiries, complaints and other information

To underscore the Corps Scorecard on Emergency Preparedness and Response, it is worthy to note that the Corps has been a key player at responding to national emergencies in partnership with the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) in cases like, bomb blast, plane crash, building collapse, etc and as such no singular scorecard may suitably represent FRSC overall contributions.

The Capacity of Healthcare Delivery In Nigeria

The Capacity of Healthcare Delivery In Nigeria

Nigeria is a lower middle-income country with a population of 174 million and a Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of 522 billion US dollars. Nigeria is a Federation of 36 States and a Federal Capital Territory.

There are 774 local government areas (LGAs) across the country. The health care system is largely public sector driven, but there is substantial private sector involvement in the provision of health services.

As at 2012 there were more than 34,000 health facilities, 66% of which were owned by the three tiers of Government (Federal, State, and LGAs).

The Capacity of Healthcare Delivery In Nigeria (Cont'd)

The secondary and tertiary level health facilities are mostly found in urban areas, whereas rural areas are predominantly served by Primary Health Care (PHC) facilities.

The Federal Government owns many of the tertiary level health facilities as well as some secondary health facilities which are operated by Federal agencies

Each State hosts at least one Federal-owned tertiary health facility. Most of the publicly owned secondary health facilities are owned by the States.

- Cattle rustlers to mention but a few.




GENERAL INSECURITY SITUATIONS AFFECTING HEALTHCARE DELIVERY/COVERAGE cont..

SECURITY EFFORTS IN PROVIDING HEALTHCARE SERVICES IN NIGERIA

In many instances there must be a combined efforts of Security agencies to provide access for healthcare providers to needed areas through patrols and escort services.



Key Challenges to Emergency Responders In Healthcare Delivery

Paucity of Funds

Managing the affairs of Post crash care and Emergency Responses are capital intensive.



Adequate funding is needed to drive the entire process including monitoring and evaluation processes.

Capacity Building

There is need to ensure consistent **training and retraining** of the first responders on first aid handling and other medical emergencies.






Inadequate Equipment

Equipment are necessary to carry out effective rescue emergency responders along the identified critical corridors in the country.

Inadequate equipment translates to ineffectiveness and more lives are lost than saved as a result.



Limitations of certain beliefs have had negative effects on emergence responses especially where such beliefs do not have medical or scientific backgrounds.



Lack of Synergy/Inter-Agency Collaboration

The harmonious synergy required to achieve a coordinated common goal in times of emergencies between Security Agencies in Nigeria is not adequate enough.



Organizational score points are most times pursued ahead of national interest.

The involvement of untrained/incompetent first responders at emergency scenes is a concern.

The proliferation of **fake**

Drugs in the country is also at an alarming rate.



MANAGEMENT OF BY-STANDERS

The management of the activities of bystanders in the country is a serious concern.

In many instances, poor handling of victims worsens the situation which may eventually leads to avoidable death.

The commitment by the government in providing good healthcare delivery and services in the country cannot be over-emphasised.

Nigeria in recent times has experienced a lot of security challenges which resulted in the destruction and wanton losses of many lives.

Inasmuch as some of the security challenges stem from dimensions difficult to predict, emergence responses and responders must step up their mechanisms to minimize the effects on human lives and general wellbeing of the society.

For Nigeria as a nation be able to provide Universal Healthcare Coverage and ensure Human Security which is defined as protecting the vital core of all human lives in ways that enhance human freedoms and human fulfilment, all hand must be on deck.



On this wise,

- There should be a compacted synergy between all agencies of government.
- Funding for health sector should also be given the priority it deserved.
- Government should put an effective machinery to checkmate the excesses of drug barons in the country who engage in supplying fake/sub-standard drugs in the country.
